The MenEngage Symposium

This was sent to both major presidential campaigns to guide them in their efforts to counter gender-based violence during the first 100 days of the next administration. Once the election is over, this coalition will be developing a further advocacy strategy to work with whoever is elected in order to implement these recommendations.

Accessing Safe Abortion Services Amid the COVID-19 Pandemic by the Journal Sexual and Reproductive Health Matters examines the ways the pandemic has exacerbated access to abortion services and ways that countries, communities and health care systems are addressing these additional barriers in order to continue to provide access to abortion.

The Future of Masculinity (on-line Zine) (Next Gen Men, Aug, 2020).

Explores the dimensions of our modern, gender-informed lives including self, health, peers, culture and relationships. It's the zine on how reimagining a plural, positive and progressive vision of masculinity can help each of us where we need it most -- at home, at work, in our relationships, in our heads, and in how we engage in the turbulent world around us.

"Gender harassment and institutional betrayal in high school take toll on mental health" (Science Daily, Sept., 2020)

This short report details the short and long-term toll that is experienced by adolescents as a result of gender harassment.

Making Connections for Mental Health and Well Being Amongst Men and Boys in the US (2014, Prevention Institute)

This 56 page report explores the dynamics of mental health and wellness in the US, implications for men and boys, and treatment/intervention recommendations. Data from the World Health Organization (2007), finds that the US had the highest rate of Mental Illness in the world. A number of factors relate to this statistic, but social norms and pressures of masculinity exacerbate this issue with men, and men and boys of color may experience higher rates of mental illness due to intergenerational and persistent trauma and oppression.. The mental health system, by and large, is still ill equipped to identify and support men in meaningful ways to address these mental health challenges.

Masculinities and COVID-Making the Connections (Promundo, Sept, 2020)

This 68 page report explores the key issues in relation to men, masculinities, and COVID-19, the impact of COVID-19 on men and women in different social groups and sets out principles and recommendations for policymakers and other decision-makers to take masculinities into account to create effective responses to the crisis.

"Police Unions and the Obstacles they Pose" is a new 32 page report published by the Community Resource Hub for Safety and Accountability explores the hazards of police unions and provides some recommendations on ways that communities can respond to and address the power of police unions.

Unequal Partners: Teaching about Power, Consent and Healthy Relationships 4th Edition (Center for Sexuality Education, July 2020; \$99).

This, the 4th edition, of *Unequal Partners* is laid out in two volumes: Volume 1, for young and middle adolescents and Volume 2 for college students. Both volumes include 50

lessons that are age and developmentally appropriate and which help young people examine various aspects of healthy and unhealthy relationships.
