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Origins of Race...

Takeaway Offerings

Race is a human construct, born of scientific, religious, and legal actions to create a white class.

The purpose was to dehumanize non-white people thus claiming white superiority, and to justify the colonization of Indigenous land and Indigenous erasure around the globe institutionalizing anti-Indigeneity

It was also used to justify the enslavement of African people, and the eventual development of anti-Blackness, race caste, and colorism.

Takeaway Offerings

Intersectionality...

Begins with recognition that we all have multiple and layered identities

Centers those at the deepest of the intersections and the margins of identity, on the margins of the margins

De-centers single-issue approaches

De-centers privilege

Assumes that those on the margins can represent on behalf of identity groups and are not hybrid

Encourages all to self-identify and hold understanding of how we are positioned in relationship to those at the intersections



Takeaway Offerings

Intersectionality...

Challenges those with layers of privilege to self-locate and no longer uphold implicit identity

Sets a clear priority to end Patriarchy, Eurocentricity, Capitalism, and other 'isms simultaneously


Intersectionality is **NOT**...

....intended to amplify the experiences of those with compounded privilege




Single-Issue Approaches












EXAMPLE OF THE MARGINS OF THE MARGINS

- Black Transwomen are experiencing violence and homicide at greater rates (In July 2020, 6 Black transwomen found killed in 9 days)
- Focusing solely on women, transgender communities, and African-American communities as single communities leaves Black Transwomen marginalized within each of these single issues
- Those who seek to hurt Black
 Transwomen know and benefit thus escalating the violence

Takeaway Offerings

DECOLONIZATION FIRST STEPS: (BECAUSE THE REAL WORK WE NEED TO BUILD TOGETHER)

- Learn who you are and where you came from
- Address the oppressive systems and histories that enable you to occupy the territory you now do
 - · Learn whose land you live on and what has been done to them
 - Find out how you benefit from that history and activate one strategy wherein you can use your privilege from which to dismantle that
 - Share the knowledge that the work of Decolonization is for everyone

Decolonization...

DECOLONIZATION LOOKS LIKE

- Decolonization looks like living without paralyzing guilt/ shame of your identity and the social identity you have inherited.
- Decolonization looks like giving up social and economic power and privilege that directly disempowers, appropriates and invisibilizes others
 - Decolonization looks like dismantling patriarchy
- Decolonization looks like doing the work to find out who you are, where you
 came from and how you got here and committing to build communities
 that work together to find out where we are going (together) and what our
 individual roles and responsibilities are in this process.
 - Decolonization looks like celebrating who we are and connecting the unique knowledge we each bring work together to solve our global challenges

TONYA'S THOUGHT ON BLACK AND INDIGENOUS COMMONALITY:
